On the second night of a holiday, candles should be lit from a pre-existing flame after nightfall. If the second night coincides with the start of *Shabbat*, candles should be lit from a pre-existing flame before sunset.

Capital Campaign Tally Exceeds Target by 20%

Just over two years ago, our congregation launched a Capital Campaign to fund some much-needed upgrades to our building. At the time, our \$600,000 goal seemed incredibly ambitious, but today I am proud to share that we have not only reached but surpassed our goal, raising \$722,559, or 120 percent of the target.

The Capital Campaign was much larger than our typical appeals, but it turned out our members were not only ready to step forward, they were willing to go even farther than we had asked. More than half of our member households donated toward the campaign, making this a true community effort.

The final boost that pushed us over the top came from a generous donation by the Temple Israel Foundation. This fund was formed from the assets of Temple Israel Synagogue when it merged 26 years ago with Beth Tikva to form Tikvat Israel. Its mission is to provide support for Jewish causes and programs in the areas of education, Jewish identity and communal projects

throughout the metropolitan Washington area. The foundation's support of the Capital Campaign is a testament to the blended history of our congregation, and the strong community we have built.

To date, the Capital Campaign has financed essential repairs around TI, including replacing failing HVAC units, repairing the elevator, repairing the parking lot and upgrading the security of our doors and windows. Upcoming projects include replacing an aging air conditioner in the ECC wing and beginning long-delayed repairs to the roof.

I am grateful to campaign co-chairs Carol Chelemer and Howard Wilchins, and all the volunteers who helped make this possible. Thank you all for your work and support on this campaign. It has been a pleasure to work with and learn from all of you, and I look forward to going from strength to strength in our work on behalf of our congregation.

Back to Shul: Goals for the Upcoming Year

The Tikvat Israel Board of Directors took a different approach, engaging in a day-long workshop on Aug. 4 to set priorities for the upcoming fiscal year, which began on July 1, 2024, and will end next June 30.

As fall approaches, many Jewish

families start thinking about school, High

Holidays and football. (OK, maybe only some Jewish families think about football.)

To start the conversation, the board reviewed goals it had set for itself in January when it last met to review how well TI was meeting the goals of the strategic plan in Year 2.

Among the board's accomplishments so far in 2024:

- It has taken steps toward increasing participation in board meetings;
- It has empowered the TI treasurer to improve the quality of financial information and enhance the transparency of that information, enabling the board to make better fiscal decisions and informa-

tively discuss those decisions with the congregation;

- It recommended and saw the congregation approve a revision to the TI bylaws which, among other things, will add a second congregational meeting to the calendar year to allow for elections in winter;
- It supported an update to the TI website to include a guide for multifaith families and a page dedicated to inclusion;
- It endorsed the launch of the *Netivot* Religious School, now entering its second year;
- It encouraged the creation of programming to further explore Jewish traditions and create new ones; and
- It oversaw the rollout of the voluntary pledge model for membership.

Unwilling to rest on its laurels, the board then turned to how it could better meet TI's mission to Engage, Embrace, Inspire and Empower our Jewish community. Among projects and programs the board will be working on this fiscal year are these:

Engaging the Congregation

- Through better communication on important synagoguewide initiatives such as a celebration of Cantor Rochelle Helzner's 40 years with TI;
- By introducing more varied and specialized religious experiences such as a Torah yoga session, scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 8 (see *Shul* Shorts, page 2);
- Through a broader effort to recruit members to revitalized TIKVAT ISRAEL SEPTEMBER-OCTOBER 2024

teams (formerly known as committees) to work on various projects such as holiday programming, support for Israel and expanded *chesed* services for our members.

Embracing the Jewish Community

• By instituting greater outreach to the broader Jewish community.

Empowering the Congregation

- Through a new Bylaws Review Team aimed at continuing to improve synagogue operations;
- Through strengthening the *davening* corps, including more training for people who might want to participate in services on the *bimah*;
- Through a continuing evaluation of TI's staffing needs and how the staff can better serve the membership.

Inspiring the Congregation

- With expanded *Torah* study on *Shabbat* during and after services;
- With enhanced adult religious education opportunities;
- With increased participation in weekday *minyanim*, particularly in-person participation; and
- By planning for a "Year of Song" to celebrate Cantor Helzner's contributions to our community.

RABBI'S CORNER

From Paris to Elul: What the Olympics Teach Us about Teshuvah

Nothing demonstrates the importance of each moment more tangibly than the Olympic games. This summer in Paris, we repeatedly saw the profound difference that a tenth, hundredth or even five-thousandth of a second can make; the difference in having the presence of mind to stick your chest in front of your foot; or the difference in filing an appeal within

one minute or one minute and four seconds.

In race after race, sport after sport, the difference between winning a medal or not often came down to the smallest of measurements. Olympic athletes are well aware of these close margins when they are training, as well as what is at stake — which includes not only the medal, but often endorsement deals and future competition. They train for this, prepare for it and compete, knowing that every tiny detail can make a difference.

Imagine if all of us were to live our lives in this manner. This is exactly what Maimonides asks us to do as we prepare for the *Yamim Noraim* – the days from *Rosh Hashanah* to *Yom Kippur*. But, he notes, it is not only these days that matter. In the *Mishneh Torah on Laws of Repentance*, he writes:

Throughout the entire year, a person should always look at oneself as equally balanced between positive deeds and transgressions, indeed as if the world is equally balanced between positive deeds and transgressions. If you transgress one time, you may tip the balance and that of the entire world to the side of guilt and bring destruction upon yourself.

On the other hand, if you perform one *mitzvah*, you may tip the balance and that of the entire world to the side of merit and bring deliverance and salvation to yourself and others. ... For these reasons, it is customary for the Jewish people to give generously to charity, perform many good deeds, and busy oneself with doing *mitzvot* from *Rosh Hashanah* until *Yom Kippur* to a greater extent than during the remainder of the year. (*Mishneh Torah*, *Hilchot Teshuvah* 3:4)

He teaches that our deeds throughout the year matter. It is analogous to the training period for athletes and the preliminary competitions that help determine if they will even make it to the Olympics. One who doesn't put forth the effort throughout the year has little chance of making the team.

Extending this analogy, the *Yamim Noraim* are our Olympics, and Maimonides is teaching that the intensity of our efforts and the implications of our actions are magnified exponentially during this time. Every second, every inch can matter.

How would our lives be different if we knew that going out to exercise one more time or visiting a doctor might extend our life? Or if we knew that making one extra phone call to check on a neighbor could make the difference in their, or our, lives? Or if giving that extra bit of *tzedakah* could truly be the difference between life and death? Or if taking the time to visit a loved one would impact their fate?

Of course, we don't know how our deeds impact our fate – or even whether our deeds impact our fate. Each of us knows plenty of people who are paragons of good deeds, generosity and love but whose outcome does not seem to correlate with their actions.

But that is true for the Olympians as well. There are plenty of athletes who train hard, who do everything their coaches tell them to do and yet, at the last moment, they take a misstep and sprain an ankle or get COVID and can't compete in a race or who simply get an unfair ruling from a judge. All the work they have put forth over many years seems to be for naught. Yet I have never heard an Olympian say the effort was not worthwhile. The opportunity to compete in the games, win or lose, is worth the pain they have endured and the time they have devoted. They may be bitterly disappointed with the results, but they appreciate they were able to be in the game.

Can we say the same thing about our lives?

If the whole year is our time of training, then the month of *Elul* is our time trials and preliminary competitions. We have the opportunity to ratchet up our efforts, to evaluate the areas where we can improve, and to still change course to give ourselves the best opportunity to live our lives at our highest levels.

This year, we are offering programming to help you with your own "training" – whether it is "Stretching into *Elul*" with Sarah Fishman, to align our body and our soul, a side trip on Sunday, Sept. 8 to stretch our minds or any of the other opportunities offered here or in the wider community. If we want to be at our best to "compete" on these coming holidays, we know that we must put in the effort to prepare for them.

We go into this holiday season knowing that no one action or set of actions guarantees a particular outcome, just as every athlete knows there is no guarantee of a medal. There are simply far too many factors that are beyond our control. In life, as in sports, the only thing that we can do is put forth our maximum effort. When we do, we will know that if we stumble or get an unfair ruling, it will not be because we didn't try.

I pray that each of us will be able to look upon our lives and see that the opportunity to compete – or in our case, to live a righteous life – is worth everything.

When you are in the synagogue for services, a meeting, a special occasion or any other purpose, remember to visit Tikvat Israel's pop-up library.

Here are a few books to borrow at TI's pop-up library:

The Book of V, by Anna Solomon. Three characters' stories overlap, showing how women's lives have and have not changed over thousands of years.

The Boy Who Loved Anne Frank, by Ellen Feldman. This novel is about Peter van Pels, the Dutch teen in hiding with Anne Frank, and what might have happened if he had survived.

Kitchen Table Wisdom: Stories That Heal, by Rachel Naomi Remen. A collection of true stories that draw on the human tradition of shared experiences.

The 100 Most Jewish Foods: A Highly Debatable List, by Alana Newhouse. This book features 100 Jewish recipes along with cultural and historical context.

The Weight of Ink, by Rachel Kadish. The lives of two women are interwoven in this novel that takes place in London in the 1660s and the early 21st century.

Wherever You Go, There They Are: Stories About My Family You Might Relate To, by Annabelle Gurwitch. An insightful collection

Flax Library Catalog

You can also reserve books while searching the Flax Library catalog. First, conduct a search and click on the book title to view the full record. Then, click on "Reserve" on the left-hand side. Fill-in your name and e-mail address and hit "Send".

To reserve multiple items, click on "Add to Book Bin" on the left-hand side. Continue searching until done. Open "Book Bin" at the top of the page and click "Reserve" in the blue band. Fill-in your name and e-mail address and hit "Send."

You will be notified when the books you reserved are available for pick-up.

One goal of At The Well, the founder explained, is to model and nurture relationships like those between the daughters of Zelophehad, sisters who together petitioned Moses to inherit their father's land in the absence of male siblings, and not like Sarah and Hagar, rivals for Abraham's love.

Volunteers Serve Needy at Shepherd's Table



A New Order for Our Religious Service Materials

Tikvat Israel has a newly organized collection of materials needed by those who lead religious services. It can be found under the *shulchan*, the *Torah* reading table on the *bimah*.

Jason Schwartz, chair of the Religious Practices Committee, took the lead on the recent reorganization.

"We have added some shelves with the goal of making everything easier to find and preventing items from getting lost way in the back of the very deep shelves," he says.

In the new *shulchan*, Schwartz has labelled all items. As shown in the accompanying photos, the labels refer to the items directly *above* them, as indicated by the upward-pointing arrows.

He asks all those using the *Haftarah* book, *Torah* reading binders and large print *siddurim* to please return them with the book spines facing outward so that people can easily see what each item is. (This is not possible for the *siddur/chumash* section because of the size of the books.)
