

Michelle Sobel resigned from the director's post in mid-January. She joined TI in 2013.

"Michelle has done an outstanding job of reviving our ECC during her tenure and has created a great program of which we can be proud," TI President Melanie Grishman said. "We wish her well in her new endeavors."

Joining Kaminow on the search panel are Martie Adelman, Joshua Costa, Sarah Hardy, Robin Lempert, Jeremy Schiffer and Allison Zion.

ECC staff members Zion and Marcie Nadler are serving as acting co-directors. "They have a vast amount of experience in many aspects of the pre-school world and our children and school are in great hands," Kaminow said.

Member Survey Finds Wide Satisfaction, Identifies Needs

Tikvat Israel members appear largely satisfied with the congregation's affairs related to the clergy, synagogue management and board governance, according to a recent survey of all congregants.

> 79 percent of respondents have been members of Tikvat Israel for 10 years or longer with 6 percent reporting they have been members for two years or less.

The findings of the survey, conducted in late fall and compiled in December, carry significance because 134 responses were received from the 298 dues-paying member households who were sent surveys through e-mail and the Postal Service. This represents a healthy 45 percent participation rate. (Industry benchmarks for customer survey feedback typically range between 20 percent and 35 percent.)

Among the findings about the synagogue:

This is called a Wordle, which is a graphic representation of the most common words or phrases that congregants used in responding to this open-ended question on the recent survey: "What do you like most about being a member of Tikvat Israel?"

Long-term members remain committed to our congregation with many respondents highlighting their 20, 30, 40 or 50-plus years of membership.

On a question that allowed open feedback, congregants expressed appreciation by name for the following: Rabbi Shull, Cantor Helzner, Amy Matathias, Melanie Grishman, Sam Freedenberg and Sally Kram. All are professional staff except Kram, a volunteer who heads the Adult Education Committee, and Grishman, president of the Congregation.

> 95 percent of respondents said their religious needs are being met.

Several suggestions were made for improvements to the length of services and how aliyahs are assigned at religious services. Also referenced were the lack of services and programming for younger children.

> 83 percent issued a favorable rating of Tikvat Israel's lay leadership.

Survey participants suggested improvements could be made to place greater focus and resources on recruitment and retention of younger families. Others want to see the governing board's adoption of a more proactive long-range strategic plan.

> 88 percent agreed or strongly agreed that their administrative/office needs were being met.

In their responses, congregants identified the functional areas most in need of improvement: administrative office efficiency and responsiveness and the synagogue's accuracy in billing.

> 99 percent consider improvements to the building and grounds important.

Sanctuary lighting, the kitchen and the main lobby were identified as areas in greatest need for attention.

Congregants identified the qualities they like the most about their membership in Tikvat Israel.


In order, those qualities were the sense of community, feeling of caring, welcoming atmosphere, comfortable environment, sense of family and feeling of belonging.

The survey was constructed and managed by Rodney Matheson, a past co-president of TI who works in organizational development at the Charles E. Smith Life Communities. Matheson said he will be setting up focus groups in coming months to allow members to expand on the meaning of the survey feedback and to comment on areas not covered, such as communication.

He previously provided the survey findings to the synagogue's board of directors and shared them separately with the professional staff.

Shabbat Retreat Featuring **Outdoor Services, Farm-Fresh Kosher Meals** Set for October Weekend

Kallah 2018, Tikvat Israel's Shabbat retreat, will take place Oct. 19-21 at the Pearlstone Center in Reisterstown, Md.

The weekend retreat will feature Kabbalat Shabbat with nigunim and spirited singing; outdoor services in a peaceful, rural environment (weather permitting); campfire Havdalah with s'mores; hiking; petting of farm animals; farm-to-table kosher Shabbat meals; yoga and meditation; Torah study sessions; social programs; and children's programming.

To reserve a space, a non-refundable \$50 per person deposit is required by May 4. (Deposits will be refunded if TI has to cancel the event.) By July 2, a 50 percent payment will be required, and no refunds will be available after July 16. Payment in full is due by Aug. 15. Checks are payable to Tikvat Israel Congregation.

The retreat registration fees are as follows (per person) and include all kosher meals from Friday night Shabbat through Sunday morning breakfast: single occupancy guest room, \$305; double occupancy guest room, \$225; triple-plus occupancy guest room (for 3 or more teens or adults) \$205; cabin per adult, \$185; child 5 and younger, \$38; child 6-12, \$105. Each cabin accommodates 8-9 individuals. Two families can share one cabin.

These fees do not include Maryland's 2.4 percent hospitality tax. (Tikvat Israel is exempt from Maryland state sales tax.)

A leading authority on the connection between science and religion will present three times to congregants during Tikvat Israel's Scholar's Weekend, March 9-11.

Rabbi Geoffrey Mitelman, founder and director of Sinai and Synapses, a New York City-based organization, will join the congregation during Shabbat services and on Sunday morning.

In addition to addressing science and religion, he will talk about how our brains work.

Scholar's Weekend is returning to Tikvat Israel after a long absence thanks to the generosity of TI President Melanie Grishman, who is sponsoring the weekend in honor of the memory of her late husband, Dr. Herman Jacob Flax.

The Scholar's Weekend schedule is as follows:

- Friday, March 9. Congregational Shabbat dinner featuring Mitelman's talk, "How Do We Talk About Science and Religion?"
- Saturday, March 10. Shabbat kiddush lunch featuring the talk, "There are Places I Remember—How Memory Works and How It Doesn't."
- Sunday, March 11. Sunday brunch featuring the talk, "Is Neuroscience Undercutting Moral Responsibility?"

Rabbi Mitelman's organization, Sinai and Synapses, bridges the scientific and religious worlds with its work, and his writings have been featured in The Huffington Classifications | Classification | Classificati



Post, Nautilus, Science, Religion Today and the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. He completed his training at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. He is an alumnus of Princeton University. He appeared as a contestant on Jeopardy in March 2016.

Mitelman's appearance as this year's scholar was made possible by his longtime friendship with congregant Rabbi Alana Suskin who first met Mitelman when both served as fellows with the prestigious Rabbis Without Borders. This is a national program that positions rabbis as American religious leaders and spiritual innovators who contribute Jewish wisdom to the American spiritual landscape.

Varied Year of Science Slate Continues at TI through 2018

Tikvat Israel's Year of Science has had an exhilarating rollout with December's "Science Cinema" and a lineup of Tikvat Israel University speakers in late February on climate science, forensics, economics, health care, mathematics and computer science.



Year of Science programming will continue with Scholar's Weekend in March (see article, page 4) and Yom HaAtzmaut festivities in April featuring Irv Ellenberg, the U.S. representative for Israel's Technion, which is Israel's equivalent of MIT and CalTech rolled into one. On April 18, Ellenberg will discuss the latest technological innovations at the Technion, located in Haifa, and its major impact on the Israeli economy. Check the TI website for more information.

On May 6, Tikvat Israel will host the blues band Bad Influence featuring TI member David Thaler, in an 8 p.m. concert in the social hall. Prior to the concert, a local brewery will host a discussion of the science of beer and sell beverages during the concert. More information on reservations and costs will be available through *B'kesher*, the Shabbat sheet and TI's website.

Additional Year of Science activities are being planned or are underway. A fledgling Science Fiction Book Club, led by Hope and Phil Kott, launched in February (see story, at right), and Ma'asseh Moments featuring a display of nature photography by congregants have been appearing on the lobby screen on a rotating basis. In addition, the Year of Science initiative is supporting congregants in their delivery of Shabbat *divrei Torah* on scientific topics. Already, congregants Debby Berlyne, Harvey Kaplan and Phil Kott have delivered their informed views about the weekly parsha and what it can teach us about science. Additional Year of Science *divrei* are under development by congregants Danny Bachman, Anita Brenner and Cliff Fishman. The Year of Science Committee is seeking additional Torah interpreters. As part of Tikvat Israel's Year of Science, we have formed a Science Fiction Book Club. Despite the nasty weather on Feb. 4, five synagogue members got together after minyan to establish ground rules and select a book to read before the next meeting.

In memory of Science Fiction Grand Master Ursula K. LeGuin, who passed away recently, the group agreed to read the classic *The Left Hand of Darkness*. Winner of both the Nebula and Hugo awards (the highest honors that can be granted for fantasy and science fiction works), this thought-provoking novel tells the tale of first contact with an alien planet where all the inhabitants are of one sex, and the single earthman is forced to understand the equality of all beings.

The book club will meet on the first Sunday of every other month, except when there is a conflict with a religious or federal holiday. To avoid meeting on Passover, our next club date will be at 10 a.m. on Sunday, April 8.

Members will alternate presenting four books for consideration and selection by all present members of the club. All forms of writing – novels, short story collections, first books in a series or standalone books in a series may be presented so long as they are available in the Montgomery County library system.

In addition to the written form of science fiction, fantasy or alternate history, the club also may consider written story/movie combinations.

The Adult Education Committee continues its programmatic year with a series of events exploring both the religious and the secular aspects of Jewish life.

After delving into the relationship between religion and science, congregants can explore Jewish humor when TI partners with Theater J to host Tikvat Israel Day on March 18 at the downtown D.C. theater. Theater J is located at 1529 16th St., N.W.

In May, two events, religious and secular, are scheduled. On May 6, the committee is hosting a synagogue fundraiser titled "Jews, Brews and Blues." In partnership with the Year of Science Initiative, the event will include a presentation on the science of beer, a beer tasting and a concert by the blues band Bad Influence. David Thaler, a TI member, is the band's drummer. Ticket information will be available on TI's website.

The program year will conclude with Adult Education Shabbat on May 19. The committee is planning a special service with Cantor Helzner and congregant Danny Bachman to create a unique Shabbat experience featuring committee members. A kiddush lunch following services will feature a panel discussion on a topic aligned with the Year of Science initiative.

Tikvat Israel to Acquire New Shabbat, Festival Siddur

This spring, Tikvat Israel will adopt a new siddur for Shabbat and festival services to replace our current 30-year-old prayer book.

The new siddur, Siddur Lev Shalem, follows the same format and style as the popular mahzor our congregation adopted eight years ago for the High Holidays.

Synagogue members and friends can support the acquisition of these new sid-durim through donations that will allow them to dedicate one or more prayer books in memory or honor of family members or friends.

Siddur Lev Shalem is designed for use by individuals as well as for congregations, at home and in the synagogue. It begins with preparation for Shabbat — including meditations on candle lighting, a song that incorporates halakhic instructions, a passage about the *neshamah y'teirah* (additional spirit) of Shabbat, an introduction to Shabbat from the Zohar, and much more.

In the tradition of *Mahzor Lev Shalem*, the siddur includes an array of sources and commentary — historical, halakhic and spiritual on — the border of each page. While it includes all the traditional prayers, psalms, and songs that are familiar to us, it serves also as an anthology, offering readings to celebrate Shabbat as well as material for study.

The new siddur's highly readable translation uses more contemporary language than previous editions. In addition, all of the blessings, psalms and songs are transliterated to let people from all backgrounds fully participate in services. There is also extensive commentary geared to both the novice and the learned.

Our current *Siddur Sim Shalom* was first issued more than 30 years ago and already has undergone one new edition prior to *Lev Shalem*. As a result, it lacks many of the changes in language and style that Judaism's Conservative movement has adopted since then, such as gender neutrality.

The campaign to raise funds for the new siddurim was launched earlier this year with a letter to all members that explained the benefits of the new prayer book and asked for donations to dedicate a copy. The requested donation to dedicate a prayer book is \$54 each. Forms for providing the wording of the dedications are available from the synagogue office.

The synagogue aims to have the new siddur in place in time for *Shavuot* in May. Before then, Rabbi Shull will offer members an opportunity to sample *Lev Shalem* and hear an explanation of its new features at the start of Shabbat services on March 3. In lieu of preliminary services, he will conduct a prayer/study session using highlights from the new siddur (from 9:30 - 9:50 a.m.).

Kallah 2018 - One Shabbat as One

With great anticipation, we are making plans for *Kallah 2018*, our Shabbat retreat at the Pearlstone Center in the lovely countryside northwest of Baltimore. This intergenerational get-away from Friday, Oct. 19, through Sunday, Oct. 21, at the nation's premier Jewish retreat center, will be a chance to relax, recharge and renew.

Please take a look at the details of *Kallah 2018*, including a proposed agenda, on page 4 in this issue. We are planning a truly special program for people of all ages.

My purpose in highlighting *Kallah 2018* in this edition of Shull to Shul is not to persuade you that this wonderful Shabbat experience will make a major difference in your life — though it certainly will. My purpose is to persuade you that this wonderful Shabbat experience will make a major difference in the life of our congregation. Yes, Tikvat Israel will be changed by several dozen of our members sharing a full Shabbat in a stunning natural setting. How is that so?

Well, since I am writing this article during the week of Shabbat Yitro in early February, let me make the case by drawing on an important lesson the rabbis teach about the second verse of the Torah portion from Exodus 19:2: "Having journeyed from Rephidim, they entered the wilderness of Sinai and encamped in the wilderness." Ever attuned to the wording of the Torah, Rashi (Rabbi Shlomo ben Yitzhak), in 11th century France, points out that the verbs referring to Israel have been plural —"they entered," "they journeyed." Yet here in this verse, the Hebrew word for "encamped" is singular — "va'yichan" rather than "va'yachanu." This change in person suggests that only when Israel put aside their quarrels and differences to become one people were they fit to receive the Torah.

Of course, Rashi makes a critical point and teaches a valuable lesson about unity, but I would like to suggest a different take on this verse. Having experienced the power of Jewish summer camping as a child and as an adult, I see in this verse a lesson in the power of encampment together. Israel started by encamping as many (va'yachanu, "they encamped"), but the experience of making a home away from home, of building a community of shared experience changed them. Out of many, they became one (or as the American motto states, "E Pluribus Unum").

OK, perhaps I am stretching this a bit. The foot of Mt. Sinai was not the Pearlstone Center or a seven-week Jewish summer camp, but allowing for some rabbinic license, I am confident that spending one Shabbat together, from lighting candles on Friday night through lighting the Havdalah candle on Saturday night and beyond will bring us, all of us, together as one. Let me explain.

Those of us who will attend *Kallah 2018* will participate not only as individuals or as family members, but as "*shlichim*," that is representatives of our entire congregation. We will sing together, eat

together, laugh together and learn together. We will come to know the joy of Shabbat "byachad," (meaning together as one), and we will bring back this "ruach Shabbat b'yachad," this special Shabbat spirit, to our entire congregation. We will be witnesses to those who do not attend of the power of Shabbat as one. Friday night together, praying and eating and singing, will be an experience to be replicated as will Havdalah as the stars come out.

Yes, *Kallah 2018*, hopefully, will turn into *Kallah 2019 and 2020*, but even more importantly, *Kallah 2018* will turn into a more unified and spirited Tikvat Israel for years to come.

Haverim, I want to thank Felicia Black for spearheading our efforts at organizing *Kallah 2018* and the committee members who are deeply involved in planning the program. We hope you and your family will join us. "One Shabbat as One." Try it, you'll like it.

Rabbi's Walk to Mark Israel's 70th Anniversary

Rabbi Shull will lead the congregation on a 5-kilometer walk through Rock Creek Park on June 10 to commemorate the $70^{\rm th}$ anniversary of Israel's independence.

With details still being worked out, the Rabbi's Walk is intended to be fun and educational, giving participants the chance to learn more about Israel's history and modern Israel.

The walk is being co-sponsored by the Ways and Means Committee and the Israel Affairs Committee. USY and the Outdoors Havurah have also been involved with the planning.

A 5-kilometer walk is about three miles. For those who can't make the whole trek, there will be waystations along the route with water and information about Israel. The walk will culminate with a barbecue back at the synagogue.

Congregants Taking Lead on Creating Synagogue Archives

Paula Kasper, Betty Fishman and I recently resumed working on a project to create and organize historical archives for Tikvat Israel and its legacy synagogues.

We have accumulated a wealth of documents and other materials, such as

facility blueprints and photographs, and are now organizing and preparing an inventory. This work is taking place in a second-floor classroom.

Our plan is to eventually decorate the space before it is opened for access by members of the congregation interested

in learning about our synagogue. Tikvat Israel came into being in 1997 with the merger of Beth Tikva (which existed on our current site in Rockville) and Temple Israel (which operated on University Boulevard in Silver Spring).

What have we found? Among the more unusual discoveries are these:

- hand-written meeting notes about the founding of Beth Tikva (which took place in the 1960s);
- copies of Temple Israel newsletters (*The Light*) going back many decades; and
- cantorial concert posters from over the years.

We are reaching out to you, our congregants, for some help. If you have materials in your homes related to Temple Israel, Beth Tikva or Tikvat Israel that you would like to contribute, contact the synagogue office (301-762-7338) and one of us will be in touch. If we've piqued your interest and you'd like to help with this historical archives project, we'd love to have you join us.

Synagogue Concert in April to Feature Area Performers

Two exciting local musical groups will headline Tikvat Israel's annual concert this year. The April 15 show will feature the Seth Kibel Klezmer Band and Rak Shalom, the University of Maryland's Jewish *a cappella* singers.

The 7 p.m. concert, presented by Cantor Rochelle Helzner in cooperation with the synagogue, continues our congregation's tradition of excellent musical programs. Featured will be a wide variety of klezmer, Hebrew and popular music.



Prayer" is being led by Rabbah Arlene Berger for adults who want to better appreciate the service.


This series takes place on the third Shabbat of each month from 10:30 a.m. to noon. Remaining dates are March 17, April 21 and May 19.

Adapting Your Family's Seder to Personal Learning Styles

As Passover nears, I always enjoy exploring different artistic creations that represent the four children in the Haggadah.

In the Haggadah titled *A Different Night*, I love the subtle ways some artists dis-

tinguish one child from another, and how other pieces tell not only of the four children but also of views of Judaism throughout history. The Passover Haggadah delineates a clear responsibility to the seder leader to tell the Passover story to the next generation.

Perhaps the four children also are a reminder for the leader to keep the audi-

ence in mind. The four children are typified as the one wise, one wicked, one simple and one who does not know how to ask. How are you going to engage the different people coming to your seder?

As a Jewish educator, every time that I engage with learners, like the seder leader, I too must think about the activities I plan in order to help each student be successful. The four most common types of learners are visual, auditory, kinesthetic, and reading-and-

writing learners.

Visual learners best comprehend information by visualizing relationships and ideas. Auditory learners prefer listening to information. Kinesthetic learners learn by doing. Reading-and-writing learners prefer to consume information by reading texts and can further absorb information by condensing and rephrasing it.

This year as you plan your seder, who is going to be at your table? How can you tailor a seder to meet your participants where they are? To help get you started, I can give you

Appreciated Stock Is Always Appreciated

23,000, 24,000, 25,000, 26,000, 25,000, 24,000, 23,000

Anyone who has watched the Dow Jones Average recently has seen it reach new highs almost daily and then hit some big bumps, sending it down again. Of course, as mutual funds always warn, past performance is no guarantee of future results.

Nonetheless, current market conditions have presented many people with a pleasant problem: We hold stocks that have appreciated significantly over the past few years. That raises the age-old conundrum: Hold or sell?

There is a third option that resolves that dilemma: Donate.

Holding stock poses the uncertainty of whether it will continue to rise or go down. Selling can result in large capital gains taxes even at reduced rates for long-term investments. Sometimes a sale can push a seller into a higher tax bracket, even with recent changes in the law.

A gift of appreciated stock to the Fund for the Future could be an excellent way to liquidate such holdings without facing a tax bill but actually getting a tax deduction.

The fund can accept stocks and invest them. The value of the stocks on the day received is the amount that may be deductible as a charitable contribution. You may need to consult your own accountant or financial adviser.

One Tikvat Israel family that has already contributed to the fund through the gift of appreciated stock is Alan and Susan Apter. They donated stock that Susan had received as a gift when she was a child.

In Susan's case, she had received shares of AT&T before it was split up in the 1980s into seven so-called Baby Bells. Subsequently, those companies merged into Verizon, AT&T and Century Link. As a result, Susan's original AT&T shares were replaced by shares in the seven Baby Bells and then by shares in the three surviving firms.

Trying to track the peregrinations of these stocks over a 30-year period to determine the cost basis for tax purposes was an impossible job. Instead of dealing with that complex task, the Apters opted to donate the stock to the Fund for the Future.

"Why not get it all together and donate it to the synagogue to help the future of the synagogue," Susan says. "It takes a burden off of you and will help the synagogue."

She said Julia Pitkin-Shantz, former chair of the fund, "was very helpful during the process, getting me the forms, providing instructions. So that was important. She went the extra mile."

ISRAEL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE HASBARA: Focus on Israeli Innovation

(Sixth in a Continuing Series)

As Israel approaches its 70th anniversary, let's focus on the significant contribution Israel and its people have made to all mankind over the past seven decades. I will share several examples of Israeli innovation which I consider indispensable. Of course, with only these few items, this list is far from exhaustive (and does not reflect any prioritizing), but I'm willing to bet that it includes technology you use today!

- 1. Cell phones. All over the world today people rely on cell phones. Israeli tech firms developed the basic technology and continue working on making phones more convenient, less cumbersome, and more economical.
- **2. GPS and Ride-sharing.** Do you use a GPS system when you drive? Do you ever use Uber (or the equivalent) for getting around? Nearly half of the 12 current companies in the ride-sharing market were built in Israel. *Techcrunch.com* provides new and interesting information on this subject.



- 3. Cyber security. We all benefit from the Israeli development and continual enhancement of cyber security. Israel has shared much of its know-how with governmental agencies and high-tech companies. IBM, Intel, Google, Microsoft, HP, Cisco, and Apple all have large research operations within Israel. And did you know that the inventor of the thumb drive (the "diskon-key" portable storage device) was Israeli Dov Moran?
- **4. Medical imaging.** Whoever could have imagined a generation ago that a camera could be made in the form of a pill that one would swallow to enable a doctor to get clear photos of a person's gastrointestinal system? The PillCam from Israel is now the "gold standard" for intestinal visualization. (For details, see: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Given_Imaging.)
- 5. **Drugs.** In 2017, Teva Pharmaceuticals was identified as the largest producer of generic medications in the world. Like at least five other major Israeli pharmaceutical producers, it engages in ongoing and extensive medical research.
- Military applications. Israel has worked with the United States on military technology and data sharing for many years. The two nations have collaborated on developing and/ or deploying defensive systems (e.g., Iron Dome, David's Sling, and Arrow for missile defense systems). The U.S. military also has benefited from Israeli medical technology (such as exo-skeletal systems to aid wounded military personnel as well as enhance individual abilities in strength-based skills). Other Israeli innovations are the Helmet Mounted Display System, Emergency Bandage (now in every U.S. soldier's first aid kit) to minimize blood loss and prevent infections, the Coral-SD portable concealed weapons detector, and new automated devices to assist in detecting enemy intruders (SPI-DER system). (Many of these technologies have civilian applications as well.) For more in this area, see the fact sheets at: www.aipac.org/AmericasPartner.

Congregants Join Church Volunteers in Building Comfort Cases

About 100 individuals affiliated with Tikvat Israel and neighboring Twinbrook Baptist Church gathered on Martin Luther King Jr. Day to assemble backpacks and small duffel bags for foster children, teenaged and younger.

The participants filled 123 of these comfort cases with essential personal items, including a blanket, pajamas, a stuffed animal, a coloring book and crayons or a journal and pen and pencil set, and toiletries. Each case provides the essentials for the first few days in a new

home as well as comfort items to help ease a scary transition.

In addition, the synagogue and church volunteers packed 70 lunches in the TI social hall for a local homeless shelter. Children designed greeting cards, and 40 blankets were created to add to the Comfort Cases.

A highlight of the day of service was a presentation by Rob Scheer, founder of the non-profit organization Comfort Cases. Scheer spent his childhood in foster care and expressed the pain he experienced in packing his personal belongings in a trash bag that he took with him into each new place. In recent years, when

he and his partner adopted four foster children, Scheer said he was surprised to discover that the children were still using tattered trash bags some 30 years later.

The goal of the Comfort Cases organization (www.comfortcases.org), he said, is to ensure the dignity of children entering foster care by providing them with a backpack or duffel bag of their own in which

to pack their personal belongings.

TIKVAT ISRAEL MARCH-APRIL 2018

Obituary: Cantor Mark Levi



Mark Levi, who served as cantor for Beth Tikva Congregation, now known as Tikvat Israel, died on Dec. 28. He was 103.

Cantor Levi began his cantorial career at Beth Torah in Hyattsville, Md., in 1958, serving there until

1964 when he was hired as cantor at Beth Tikva. He retired in 1984 as our synagogue's cantor emeritus.

With a vibrant baritone voice, Cantor Levi was known for his traditional *hazzanut* style of chanting the liturgy and his devotion to the *nussack* or melodies handed down by some of the most famous cantors of the last century.

He became the cantor at Beth Tikva when the congregation was just four years old.

In 1985, Cantor Levi and his wife, Otilia, moved to Florida where he became cantor at Beth Ami synagogue in Boca Raton. The couple moved back to Rockville a few years later and lived in Leisure World. For the last few years they have lived at Asbury Village in Gaithersburg.

When Cantor Levi first returned to Rockville, Tikvat Israel's cantor, Rochelle Helzner, invited him to participate in *Yiskor* memorial services on Yom Kippur for several years and, while he was still able, Cantor Levi would chant the *El Meleh Rachamin* prayer for the departed. "I don't think there were many dry eyes in the congregation when he finished," recalls Sam Gilston.

While known for his marvelous voice, Cantor Levi was also remembered for his kindness, humility and quick smile, as well as his desire to help the congregation in any way he could. He gave annual cantorial concerts to help the synagogue raise money.

As an example of his humble nature, Steve Raucher, who was president of Beth Tikva during part of Cantor Levi's tenure, recalls when a salary discussion came up one year, Cantor Levi didn't ask for a raise. All he asked for was a closet where he could store his robes and coat.

Cantor Levi was born in 1914 in the Transylvania region of Romania. He was the youngest of 10 children and his family home was the center of the small Jewish community of the town, serving as a grocery store and farm as well as a *chadar* where the village's Jewish children went to school.

During World War II, he was arrested and spent three years in a forced-labor camp. At the end of the war when he returned home, he found his village burned to the ground. His parents are believed to have perished at Auschwitz.

While in Romania he met his wife, Otilia, and they married in 1947. They moved to Israel in 1950 and then to the United States in 1953. After a few years in New York, Cantor Levi learned about

a job opening for an embroiderer in Washington, D.C., and the family moved to Hyattsville, Maryland, in 1958.

While being a part-time cantor, Cantor Levi set up his own business, the American Monogram Company. The firm was mainly involved in the stitching of names and initials on shirts, towels and even the lining of fur coats, but for Cantor Levi it was much more than that; he was an embroidery artist.

Using his embroidery skills, he would sew portraits of famous people, John Kennedy, Richard Nixon, Bob Hope, Bing Crosby and even Tennessee Ernie Ford. Perhaps one of his most important assignments, however, was when he was asked to embroider the patch worn by the Apollo 8 astronauts.

Cantor Levi is survived by his wife, Otilia, of Asbury Village, his sons Ron (Debbie) of North Potomac and Allen of Annapolis, Md., grandchildren Erin (Brad), Adam, Haley and Brianna, and great grandchildren Orly and Augie.
